



## Our Curriculum

At Egginton Primary School we offer a curriculum that is broad, balanced and relevant to the needs of our children. Central to all we do in school is the spiritual, moral, social, cultural, intellectual, physical and creative development of the children.

The school curriculum comprises all learning and other experiences that we plan for our pupils. A carefully balanced programme of teaching the National Curriculum subjects is maintained and we seek to deliver a creative programme of study.

Subjects delivered include Literacy, Maths, Science, Computing, P.E., Geography, History, Music, Art, Design Technology, Primary Languages (French) , Religious Education, PSHE (Personal Social Health) and Citizenship.

As a small school we believe that whole school topics would enable the sense of a learning community to be enhanced. Topics are introduced at the beginning of term with a WOW! Challenge Assembly. At the end of the term, a Celebration Assembly allows the children to share their learning with each other and parents. The teachers plan and work closely together to ensure all our children receive a creative, challenging and relevant curriculum.

Specific Enrichment weeks are included each term. These include, Anti bullying week, Wellbeing and safety week, Healthy living week, Science Fortnight, Art challenge and Our World week.

In England, Reception age children work on a Foundation Stage Curriculum that enables the children to explore their understanding of the world through their own interests. This is carefully developed through the challenges and learning interactions made with the staff to move the children's learning forward. In years 1 and 2 children work within Key Stage 1 guidelines. In years 3, 4, 5 and 6 children work within Key Stage 2 guidelines. In each case the curriculum delivered will always be appropriate to the age and ability of the individual child. Our Curriculum overview is a working document and staff are encouraged to engage children in the learning process to ensure the curriculum; whilst remaining within the National Curriculum Framework 2013, represents the interests of and relevancy for the children.

Parents receive a Curriculum Overview for each topic at the beginning of term to enable them to support the learning happening in school, as members of our learning community.
