

Music Development Plan for Egginton Primary School 2024

Name of Music Lead: J. Banister

At Egginton Primary School, we want our music curriculum to introduce the next generation to a broad repertoire of music from the Western Classical tradition, and to the best popular music and diasporic music from around the world. We believe music:

- is all around us;
- is the soundtrack to our lives;
- connects us through people and places in our ever-changing world;
- is creative, collaborative, celebratory and challenging;
- can bring communities together through: the shared endeavour of whole-school singing; ensemble playing; experimenting with the creative process and through the love of listening to friends and fellow pupils performing.

Using the Sparkyard work scheme, which aligns with the Model Music Curriculum, we aim to ensure a universal provision of music education for all pupils as follows:

Key Stage 1

• Pupils should receive a minimum of one hour teaching a week which may take the form of short sessions spread across the week.

Key Stage 2

- Pupils should receive a minimum of one hour teaching a week which may take the form of short sessions spread across the week.
- Pupils should be taught to sing and play musically with increasing confidence and control. They should develop an understanding of musical composition, organising and manipulating ideas within musical structures and reproducing sounds from aural memory.
- We commit to delivering a whole-class instrumental programme lasting a minimum of one term but usually a year for year 3 and 4 pupils every 2 years. The mandatory term will be supported by teachers from the local Music Education Hub. We encourage progression activities beyond Whole Class Instrumental teaching (WCIT). We recognise that the MMC celebrates the inclusion of pupils with special educational needs and disabilities as it does the leaps in technology that have made available new tools and adapted instruments, leading to improved access and greater choice for all pupils to realise their creative potential.

We will review progress against the School Music Development Plan with staff annually and at a governors' meeting in Summer/Autumn 2025.
